## Red Sox win Ontario Senior 'C' championship

All hail the champions!

The Milton HJM Red Sox claimed the Ontario Baseball Association (OBA) Senior C Championship with a 5-3 win over Ajax at Brian Best Park on Monday afternoon.

The game was not without controversy. In fact, according to Ajax, most of the tournament was controversial. A number of their players were complaining about umpiring.

"I hate for it to sound like sour grapes, which it does when you're in the other team's park," said Pat Roach, co-coach of the Ajax team. "Even though they are OBA umpires they're from the local area, they know the guys, and even if they aren't biased it looks that way to some of the guys."

Milton took the short road to the final, beating Nanticoke 5-0, Creemore 3-1, Ajax 7-5 and Kincardine 10-0 to take an undefeated record into Monday's showdown. In the double-knockout tournament Ajax, who also advanced to the final, had to down Milton twice in order to claim the title.

They almost did. In the opener a ninth inning run, on a wild pitch by Scott Gadd, gave Ajax a 6-5 lead and half an inning later the game to force a second contest.

After scoring three in the first Ajax managed to stay out in front until Milton tied it at five in the home half of the eighth on a Matt McCandless sacrifice fly to centrefield, which scored Sean Davidson.

Milton pitcher George Moore yielded to Gadd after giving up a pair of singles with one out in the ninth. Gadd struck out John Walsh but walked Steve Wyzynski to load the bases. Gadd's wild pitch went off the shin pad of Milton catcher Doug Dunn, easily allowing Mark Harmsivort to score the eventual winning run.

In game two the visitors took a 3-0 lead before Milton began to chip back with a run in the bottom of the fifth. In a contest where 13 of 17 leadoff hitters reached base it was obvious that three runs weren't going to be enough to win. Milton put their leadoff man on base in seven of eight innings.

Charlie Hyatt reached base in the fifth when Tim Roberts tried to score from third with no one out on a ground ball hit to the Ajax third baseman Wyzynski. The third sacker fired to the plate and nailed Roberts for the first out of the frame. McCandless turned things back around for the Red Sox when he doubled to left centre and drove in Hyatt from first.

After Ajax went down in the sixth Davidson led off with a ground rule double in the bottom of the inning. A walk to designated hitter Doug Timbers and a single by catcher Dunn plus a stolen base and a wild pitch meant Red Sox centrefielder Mario Galvao and second baseman Tim Roberts could score two runs with sacrifice flies. The three-run inning gave the Red Sox a precarious 4-3 lead.

It was then that controversy unfolded. It wasn't controversy between the teams, though there was plenty of that at other times. In this case it was between the umpires and Ajax.

Ajax shortstop John Walsh reached first in the top of the seventh on a single, moved to second on a sacrifice by Wyzynski and to third on a passed ball. Clean-up hitter David Meredith hit a one-hopper to Rick McTrach at first base and Walsh headed for the plate in a bid for the tying run.

McTrach threw a perfect strike to Dunn at the plate and Walsh came in hard with a feet-first slide. Dust obscured the close play, though the ball had definitely beaten Walsh. The

home plate umpire hovered over the action, the dust cleared, and Dunn appeared to reach for the ball before holding it up with his bare hand for the umpire to see.

After the out call Ajax protested vehemently, claiming the ball had been momentarily knocked free. Despite an appeal to the first base umpire the decision stood, to Ajax yet another injustice in a weekend of close calls that had gone against them.

Later, Milton manager Glenn Turner admitted the umpires had made a mistake. But, he added, "except for that they (Ajax) had nothing to complain about."

Greg McGuire, the first base coach for Ajax at the time, said he could clearly see the ball on the ground. "The guys get down after bad calls and every out counts in a close game like this," Roach said.

The game resumed after Sean Davidson came in to pitch in place of Moore. He gave up a single to Peter Babiak before striking out Gerry Brockman to end the inning. In the bottom half of the frame, Red Sox lead off hitter McCandless ripped a Babiak offering down the rightfield

line for an insurance home run to fashion the final 5-3 tally.

Ajax managed to put the first two hitters on in the eighth but, with one out, Ian Fletcher hit into a double play to end the rally. Roberts tagged Jeff Levy breaking from first and threw to McTrach at first for the other out. Milton players acted as if they had just won the game, which thanks to a one, two, three final inning, they just about had.

"The first day we had a 13-inning game and that used up a lot of pitchers," said Roach later. "We went to the well one too many times and couldn't make up for it with our bats. We just couldn't get the clutch hits."

Roach said he knew it would be a close game due to the 7-5 Milton win and the 6-5 Ajax victory in previous meetings between the teams. "I would do everything the same way again if I had the chance. We expected to be in the final and we'll be back."

Roach said the difference was the strong catching of Dunn for the Red Sox. "He can hit and run as well as play great defence. We have two

catchers, one for defence and one for offence, and it's tough to choose. Their guy does it all."

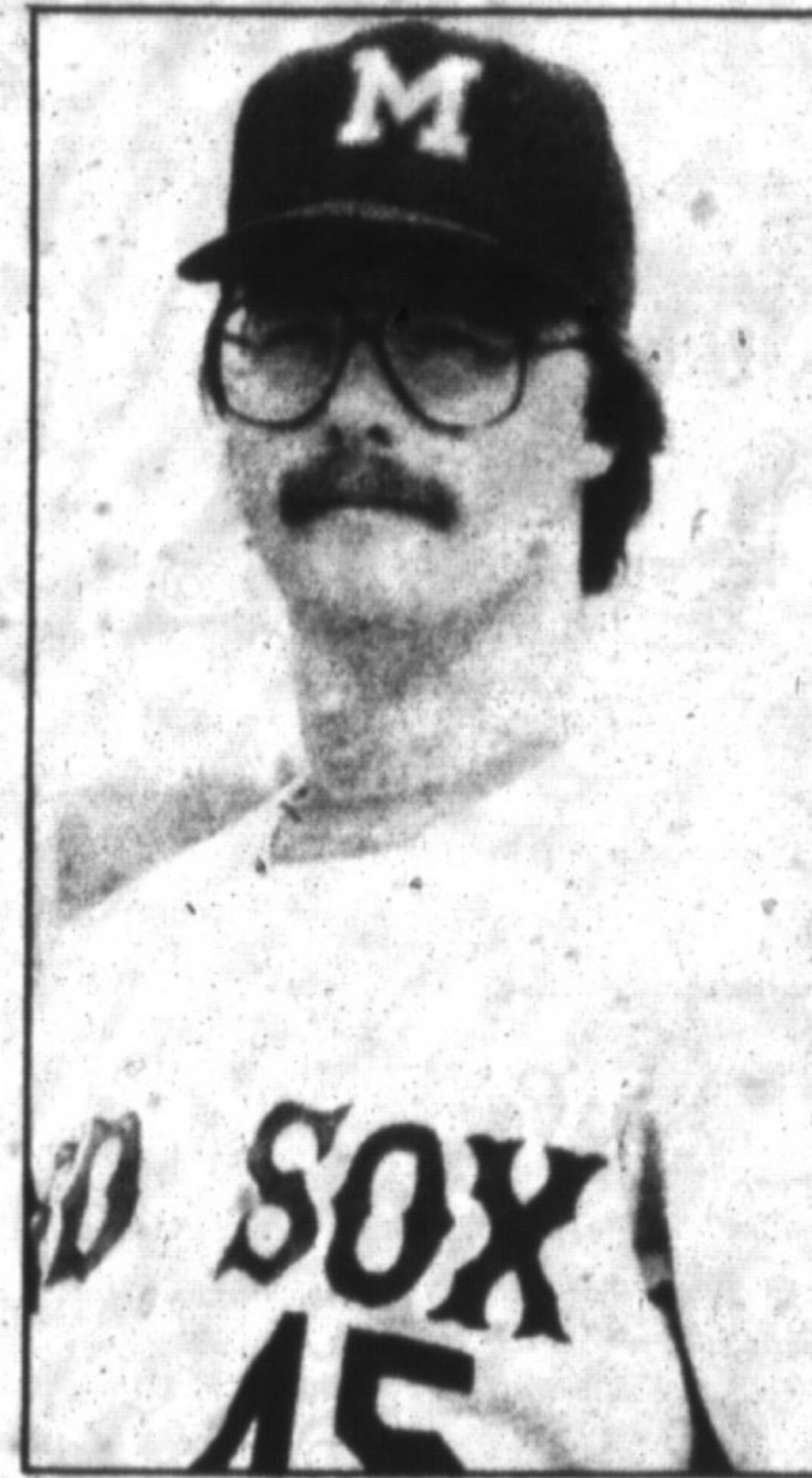
A happy Turner gave credit to pitching and defence for the first Milton OBA championship since he joined the team in 1977. Milton lost in the 1987 OBA championship to Simcoe.

"Last year we cleaned house after our bad season and it takes time to come together," he said. "The pitching was there. The key was Paul McCutcheon's complete game in the 10-0 win over Kincardine. He said his arm was sore but his performance allowed us to save arms. Davidson's first pitch in the tournament was here in the last game."

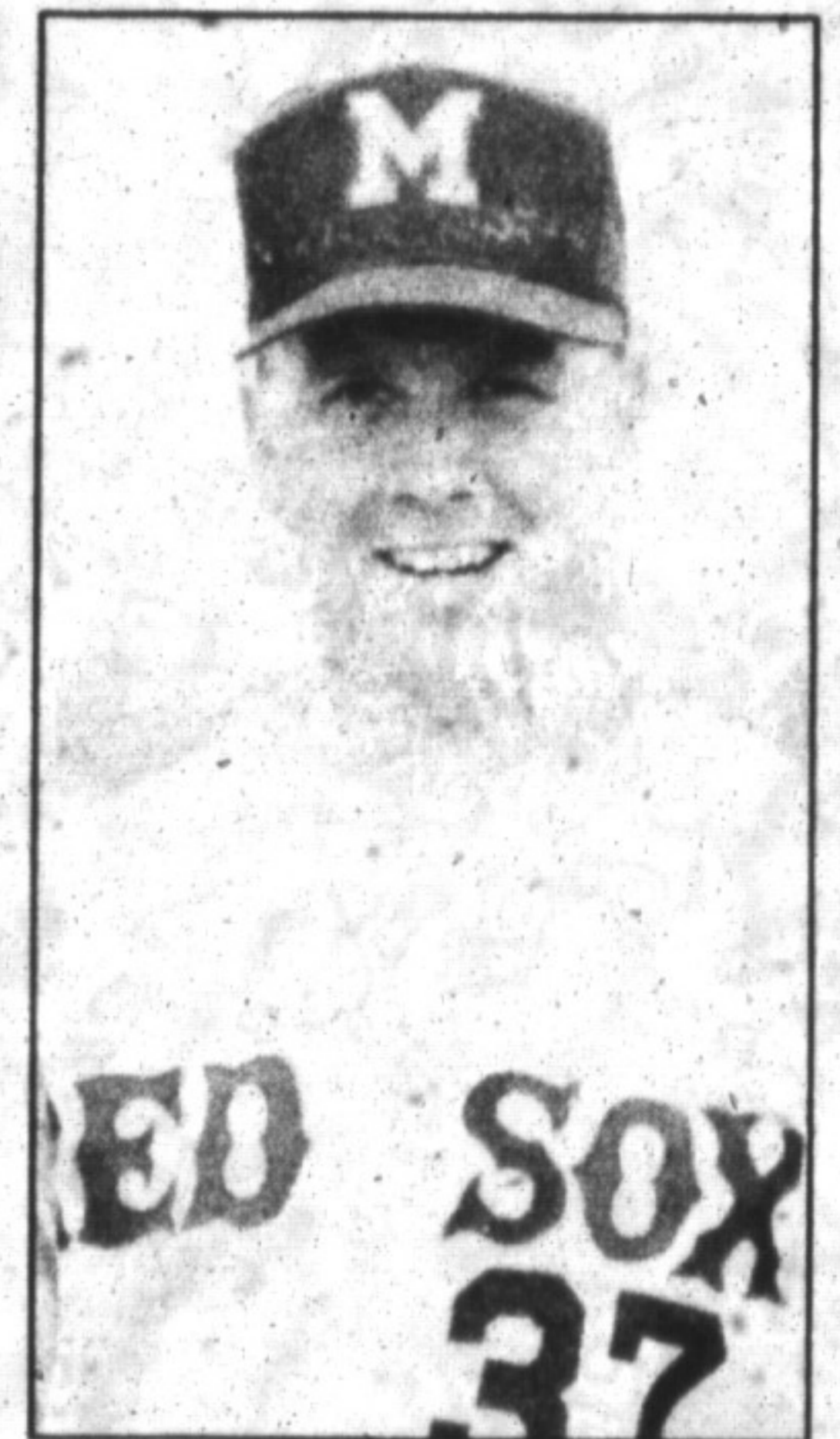
Turner also gave credit to the infield, which played solidly despite some mistakes in the first game of the doubleheader final. McTrach especially excelled, digging a number of throws out of the dirt to get key outs.

"Skip (McTrach) probably won't do that again in the next millennium," said Turner. "Though it does show what 20 years experience can do and it instills a charge in the younger guys."
