Navin, Chouinard win state title

Duo leads TCSF to runner-up finish

KALAMAZOO — Traverse City St. Francis boys made history Saturday, finishing second at the

Division 4 state tennis finals. It's the first

runner-up fin-ish in Gladiators' program history and made possible by strong play across the



board. Three St. Francis singles players and one doubles tandem reached the finals, highlighted by a flight championship for Sean Navin and Brendan



Chouinard at 2 Doubles.
"It feels absolutely amazing. It felt really good to pull through and get the win,"
Navin said. "I thought we could (win a state title) before this year, but had some really tough matches. Once the draw came out this year, I knew we had a strong shot."
Navin and Chouinard topped Ann Arbor Greenhills 6-2, 4-6, 7-6 (7-5).
"(Sean and Brendan) have kept getting better," St. Fran-Chouinard at 2 Doubles

"(Sean and Brendan) nave kept getting better," St. Fran-cis coach Paul Bandrowski said. "They earned the 1 seed. It took everything they had. To fight for a state championship,

fight for a state championship, to beat (Ann Arbor) Green-hills, it is impressive." Navin and Chouinard each said it took a moment for them to realize they had secured the final point and the champion-ship. Chouinard turned around to face Navin, they stared for a moment and then went crazy.

"Jumping up and down, hug-ging, screaming," Chouinard recalled. "There is nothing that compares to being a champion."

There was more to be realized as well.

Navin became the all-time winningest doubles player in MHSAA history during the ship run. By winning the state championship, adding four wins to his career total, Navin finished his career total, Navi finished his career having won more matches than any player in state history — sin-gles or doubles, boys or girls — with 152 victories.

Greenhills won the team championship with an as-tounding 38 points. St. Fran-cis finished with 26. Allegan scored 23. Ludington was

fourth with 15.

"It took every single kid to play to their absolute best ability to beat Allegan," Bandrowski said. "Every flight we had to perform at, we per-formed at."
Elliott Bandrowski (2 Sin-

gles), Charlie Schmude (3 Singles) and Cody Richards (4 Singles) all reached the cham-pionship match for St. Francis. Each was felled by Greenhills. Andrew Gerling (1 Singles) and the 1 Doubles tandem of

and the 1 Doubles tandem of Tyler Tafelsky and Adam Chit-tle reached the semifinals. "After watching the Allegan team and having match after match that was so tight, I am ecstatic," Bandrowski said.
