Message from the President

In the two years that I've been President of the SDLCA I have had many occasions to speak with civil servants in the employ of the various levels of government, with agencies such as the Ministry of Natural Resources, the Ministry of the Environment – even the two Municipalities which Salerno Lake straddles.

No, this little essay is not going to turn into a screed against the bureaucrats – I found most of these people to be intelligent, conscientious and motivated to do the right thing. After all they are responsible for enforcing various bylaws or regulations designed to ensure our safety or protect and preserve our natural heritage whether it be forests,

lakes or wildlife. However what I have learned is that they are for all intents and purposes, powerless to do anything. Oh they may have offices, phone lines and statutory power – but there is so little money and it seems even less political will on the part of governments to actually deliver the services they are legislated to provide.

Take for example the enforcement of our fishing laws. With the last budget, the Liberal government of Ontario reduced the number of full time MNR enforcement officers in the entire province to four. Yes, that is four people charged with monitoring the hunting and angling activities on thousands of lakes and rivers

and forests, covering an area larger than the continent of Europe. However after a vigorous campaign by the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, the number of officers was increased to the grand total of eight. These are not the kind of numbers that will deter poachers. Bears are still being slaughtered for their gall bladders. It seems to me that if it weren't for stupidity and greed none of these scofflaws would ever get caught. Rather this paltry force is a tacit admission that we as a society just don't care enough about our wildlife to afford any resources to its protection- and what a sad commentary on our priorities.

Message from the President (cont'd)

Certainly when it comes to enforcing boating regulations the situation is no better. Has anyone seen the OPP launch a boat on our lake in the last ten years? In my opinion those who take comfort in thinking that the volumes of laws and regulations on the books will be effective in curbing reckless or antisocial behaviour, are deluding themselves. Watching the holiday weekend free-for-all on the water sometimes I marvel that we haven't yet had a fatality. How many people have actually bothered to obtain a Boating Licence? Why is it that there isn't a single statute limiting the size or horsepower of a vessel no matter how small the lake? There has been a Private Member's Bill in the Senate that would simply allow Municipalities the right to set limits for the operation of Personal Watercraft on lakes within their

boundaries. The Bill has died on the Order Roll three times, in part because the PWC industry has lobbied so vigorously against it. Whatever! If Parliament did pass the law, would the government enforce it? Remember the Wizard of Oz – all that fury and bluster but when Dorothy drew back the curtain, there was only a blustery little man pulling levers and twiddling knobs.

It's almost touching the way some people think that complaining to me about a problem will have some effect - I'm just one voice and despite my exalted office I have no authority whatsoever. Certainly it's easier to complain to me than to actively look for support within the system but as a citizen the only way to have a voice is to use it. Pay

attention to what is going on and if you feel that something is wrong, act on your feelings. Phone, send emails, write letters, do whatever it takes to try to mobilize those entrusted with the duties of enforcement. And don't just do it once because if you don't follow up on your enquiries, your complaint will almost certainly be lost or forgotten. This neglect is seldom malicious, but simply the result of overworked civil servants and under funded programs. So we must exercise our rights (and duties) as citizens in sufficient numbers to achieve results. I saw a bumper sticker the other day, which I thought expressed my sentiments very well. It said "Get Involved. The world is run by those who show up".

"I am the Environmental Director for Salerno Lake and was sent these pictures today of White Lake which flows in Salerno Lake. Apparently the logs were removed from White Lake at some point before Thanksgiving and the photographs attached depict the current conditions of the White Lake creating these extreme conditions that have many of the local residents worried.

As a cottager on Salerno for the past 28 years, I can say that I have never seen White Lake like this before and am horrified about the aquatic and ecological implications. In 2001 I completed my thesis on the natural and anthropogenic phosphorus

loading for both Salerno and White lakes and have come to know them on a indepth level. As an Environmental Scientist and Environmental Consultant, I believe these conditions are extremely high-risk for the local ecosystem and pose serious implications for the long-term health of the watershed. I can't imagine the extent of the effect this is having of the fish, biota and vegetative components of the lake.

I believe the logs need to be replaced asap in the White Lake dam so that the waters can build up and need your help to notify the appropriate people to get this done." Heather aptly and eloquently expressed our concern and she received a reply from a Mr. Doug Neal of Haliburton who is in charge of the logs at the White Lake dam. The logs were removed to facilitate repairs to the dam and he had been in contact with Roger Cunningham of the White Lake Cottagers Association. As of last Thursday one log has been replaced and the lake will remain at that level throughout the winter. The dam will be in need of further repairs next year so the process will be repeated.

The Summer in Review

Many thanks to Frank Bartley for his excellent work in preparing the fireworks display that rocked the Lake this July 2nd. When the July 1st date was rained out, Frank took the initiative. Rather than hold off on the fireworks until the August long weekend as we had planned, he spread the word around the lake via a bullhorn on a boat - and on Sunday night, people gathered offshore and were treated to a spectacular display. Had Frank waited, the fireworks would have suffered from the prolonged exposure to humidity and the show would likely have failed. So thanks again Frank – and we're counting on your expertise for next year!

In the last issue of the Salerno Sentinel I gave all the credit for the new boat launch to the Township of Minden Hills. I regret that I omitted to thank the Municipality of Highlands East because they were instrumental in this project, not only financially but also logistically. Rob Stuart said that without Highlands East it might not have been built in time for the season.
